We use boxing, education and mentoring to inspire, engage and connect.

We have a collaborated with a Boxing trainer Mia Holland who is a female professional boxer signed with BCB Promotions. She is a flyweight (8st) boxer and was previously a successful amateur, holding titles like four-time national champion and Boxcup medalist. Her first professional fight was on November 16, 2024. She is from Wolverhampton and is coached by Richie Ghent from R G Boxfit in Bilston.

Delivered by RG Boxfit and affiliated through All England boxing, this non contact programme is designed to promote physical fitness, discipline and self confidence whilst ensuring the safety of all participants. Students will work through a range of topics such as coaching, mentoring, anger management, resilience and interviewing techniques. All participants will receive a certificate at the end of the programme.

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Safeguarding

The Hidden Meanings Behind Emojis

Dear parents/carers

As the use of emojis in our digital messaging increases, these symbols can form a language of their own. This is particularly true for our young people and teenagers, who sometimes use emojis as a code to disguise their true intentions from adults.

While hidden meanings behind emojis used by young people can be harmless, some may indicate risks including extremism, drugs, sexual interactions and bullying. This was recently brought to life on the Netflix limited series, "Adolescence", which depicted the devastating consequences of harmful online interactions, and the warning signs (in the form of emojis) that are easily missed by adults.

I have included below an 'emoji's explained' sheet which has been borne out of the Netflix series. I appreciate that some of our young people will be unaware of the 'meaning' of emojis but I thought it was useful to share with you all. Thank you for your support in keeping children safe.

Emoji(s)	Potential Meaning	Emoji(s)	Potential Meaning
N	The red pill emoji is linked to incel, or "involuntarily celibate", culture, where misogynistic and extremist views are prevalent. The meaning originates from The Matrix films, but has been adopted by the manosphere to represent those who see the "real truth" in the world.	Q	The balloon emoji may be used to represent the drug nitrous oxide.
		5	Camera emojis can represent a request for nude/explicit images or videos.
•	The blue pill emoji is used in incel culture to represent the opposite of the red pill - those who are blind to the real truth and adhere to more mainstream views about gender dynamics.	5 5	Peach, aubergine and cherry emojis can all be used to represent body parts in a sexual context.
		B	The sweat emoji may also be used in a sexual context.
2	The 100 emoji is used in relation to incel culture. 
